Duar Mr. Roch!

On looking back at our day and a half of meetings week before lest, I mervel at how much was accomplished so easily. I recognised at the time your mestery of the Chair, and now I regret mot having said this personally. I also recall the cordial hospitality with which you and everyone on your term received us. I do hope we will have the opportunity of trying to be equally hospitable. The Royal Ballet and your coming to the sirport -- I can't find words better than the unadormed, "Thank you, vary much."

On reviewing my notes preparatory to my formal report to the Commission, I find two loose ends which suggest that I request clarification. I am unsure whether I should address these to you, Doctor Rahberg, or your brother, Prefessor Koch. The are:

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What should be done about possible pieces of debris and jet fuel which may deposit on the shores of the islands and bay after the ice breaks up? It would seem possible to patrol the shore line from small bouts with outboard motors or perhaps by foot, but because I know nothing of the shore line, this may be an oversimplification. How long can we expect the Greenlanders to continue to honor the present prohibition against beachcombing? We should appreciate knowing your views on this potential problem and suggestions for dealing with it.

The second uncertainty is whether it is expected that American scientists are to perticipate in the surveillance-monitoring activities summarised by Doctor Rehberg on Friday. Obviously, General Hunziker will need to carry on certain kinds of monitoring in order to be properly guided in achieving the sort of cleanup we all want, but I was not really clear as to whether American scientists were expected to join the Danish teams which will perform the monitoring-surveillance of the food chains of the Greenlanders, together with taking bottom samples and plankton when the

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time cames. We agree with your wish not to complicate this memiteringsurveillance with detailed ecological research on the biots of the bay.

If it is possible, we would appreciate learning the progress of your surveillance data as it takes form; similarly, we would be happy to share with you our findings such as data on the currents of the bay. This should help avoid duplication of effort in those areas where our interests may overlap.

I understand Dr. Scaborg received your kind letter today; he will be replying very shortly. Meanwhile, please accept my spology for troubling you with these requests. I hope to say this in person soon.
